

# Iced In

At preflight time at a mid-south AFB, the crew found our Herc covered with ice. The FE called base ops for a deicing truck only to find out that, being midsouth, they did not have



one. When the powers at large called the Operations Control Center, the instructions were, "get the closest deicing truck." The closest deicing truck was approximately 30 miles and about an hour away; cost an exorbitant amount to rent; and had a high per-mile cost to get to and from the AFB. The commercial deicer was ruled out and the guidance was, "Get the ice off the aircraft anyway you can." In a true Improvise, Adapt, Overcome spirit, the crew took the push brooms, went out the forward overhead escape hatch, and beat the ice into submission. As the ice

broke up, we swept it off the wing. Ice free, we continued our preflight and flew our mission.

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# **Update: Hearing Loss & Tinnitus Claims**

Aloha TACAMO shipmates,

I was reminded by my VSO (Veterans Service Officer), in a recent conversation, that the Dept. of Veterans Affairs is the single largest bureaucracy in our government. And, that they receive thousands of disability claims per day. "Patience is required".

My case has been on file for over two years now. I have submitted all of the evidence that TCVA has compiled and offered to our membership, as well as a "buddy letter" from a long time colleague and a second VA sanctioned hearing test. I also sent a firmly written letter stating my



sincerity and stated that I was insulted that my claim was initially denied. My VSO believes that I have made a good case and has elevated it to the next level of review.

I asked what my next step would be, should I be denied again. She responded that a hearing before a judge was the next step. And if he/she denies ... it's time to "suit up" and hire a lawyer.

Moving forward ... TCVA is working on getting a VSO to attend the September reunion to answer questions and guide our members to the correct people and forms necessary to file and track claims.

TCVA is here to support you in this challenge. Members have helped bring evidence, both anecdotal and objective, to aid in VA disability claims. Several of our members have been successful and are considered disabled from hearing loss and tinnitus. Others have been denied this status with no real evidence to support the denial. Stay strong, shipmates! Together we can get the recognition of our common, service-related injury.

### **TACAMO Career**

JOHN ALGER, One-Tour Wonder (Only Served One Tour) & TCVA Vice President for Fleet Merchandising



**What influenced your decision to join the military?** Navy recruiting team visited the ERAU campus every semester, administering exams and taking applications.

What was your service career path? Aviation Officer Candidate School, pilot pipeline, selected for jets. Earned wings in 1974 at NAS Chase then assigned as an instructor to VT-24 flying the TA-4J Advanced Jet trainer. Next came an assignment to the NAS Chase Training Department in charge of all training devices on the station including 16 flight simulators. In 1979 I went to VA-174 for transition to the A-7E. That didn't work out and I changed designator to NFO (1320). This took me to VQ-3 following stops in Newport RI and Patuxent River MD. The squadron was less than happy that I was not attending NAV school in Mather. However, 6 months after reporting aboard I was qualified 1st NAV and a couple of months later a NAV instructor.

Of the medals, awards, and qualification badges or devices you received, what is the most meaningful to you? Why? My pilot wings – a lot of work went into earning those.

Did you participate in combat operations? If so, could you describe those which were significant to you? No. When I earned my wings in AUG 74 Vietnam was winding down. One of the reasons I got stuck in the Training Command.

Of the TACAMO squadrons you were assigned to, which one evokes the fondest memories? Why? VQ-3 – the only one I was in!



What particular memory stands out from your entire service career? Why? That would have to be my first carrier qualification. Because the USS Lexington was in a yard period when I went through basic jet (T-2C), we were just field qualified and moved on to advanced jet (TA-4J). Therefore, my first qual period was in the TA-4J. A few years later, the squadron allowed me to qual again prior to reporting to VA-174 at NAS Cecil.

Which individual from your TACAMO service stands out as the one who had the biggest impact on you? Why? That would be two: John Keilty and Vern Lochausen. John was plane commander on my crew and was a great

motivator for the entire crew. He loved fun but that never got in the way of our business. Vern came a bit later after we moved to Hawaii. His influence was more subtle and not realized until later, but he gave me the confidence that I was better than some others thought.

**How has military service influenced the way you have approached your life and career?** I began my aviation career at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University which lead me to the Navy. The skills learned at both gave me a career that spanned nearly 50 years.

In what ways has TCVA helped you maintain a bond with your service and those you served with? At our reunions we have re-connected with past friends and made many new ones!

The E-6B Mercury provides an important link in the nation's strategic nuclear deterrence.

# Providing strategic nuclear communications link now, future

From NAVAIR Public Affairs

The E-6B Mercury provides an important link in the nation's strategic nuclear deterrence. It allows survivable communication between the president and the triad of nuclear weapon systems - bombers, missile fields, and ballistic missile submarines.

Sustaining this mission while preparing for the future is becoming even more important as global competition grows.

"This is a critical time for our country," said Chief of Naval Operations Operations Adm. Mike Gilday in a prepared statement to the House Appropriations Committee, Jan 12. "The People's Republic of China and Russia are using all elements of their national power to undermine U.S. interests in the global commons."

Keeping the link of communication open is a "no-fail" mission and one the Airborne Strategic Command, Control and Communications Program Office continues to help accomplish by sustaining the E-6B while also preparing for the future with a recapitalization aircraft.

"Our people understand the mission and the importance of sustaining this vital asset," said Capt. Adam Scott, program manager. "They know why these aircraft always need to be

During the past year, the program office made several significant sustainment efforts to support the fleet. Spar chord corrosion and stress corrosion cracks were discovered during in-service and depot maintenance. The current spar chord material became obsolete and the team quickly qualified a new material. Manufacturing new spar chords required converting the original 2D drawings into 3D digital files.

An additively manufactured fuel dump manifold was approved for use on the aircraft. The component replaces casted hardware that has been a sustainment concern while saving leadtime over the re-development of traditional casting tooling.

Being able to look at and attack these sustainment issues as an enterprise has really helped us," Scott said. "The collaboration across the Naval Aviation Enterprise has been invalu-

In September, the fully qualified additively manufactured water separator was approved for use on fleet aircraft. The units are replacing legacy separators that had been a top concern for the past two years.

The program procured a United Kingdom E-3D for use as an E-6B trainer aircraft, which will help increase aircraft availability and read-

"The aging aircraft is making it more of a challenge to maintain but we continue to find ways to get the job done and provide operational readiness," Scott said.

The airframe has been around for more than three decades with the Navy accepting the first E-6A in 1989 to perform the Take Charge and Move Out mission. The aircraft were then modified into the E-6B with added workstations and specialized equipment. The first E-6B aircraft arrived in 1997 with the fleet modification complete by 2003.

"Sustaining our readiness has never bee more vital to our nation's future," Gilday said. "Meanwhile, our force design requires a relentless focus on modernization to keep our platforms relevant."

With that in mind, the program has been working on a recapitalization aircraft (E-XX) that will take over the TACAMO mission. The program will use a variant of the militarized C-130J Super Hercules for E-XX TACAMO test-

The Department of Defense currently uses the C-130J in multiple services, and it is deployed at various bases worldwide. The program office will be acquiring three non-config ured aircraft for testing.

The program is also working on communica tions and mission systems integration contracts for the recapitalization aircraft to help modern ize the strategic nuclear deterrent.

\*For the nation and our allies, we are making sure the president can reach our strategic forces now and in the future." Scott said.



The secret/sacred 'scroll' was a tool developed in OPS to layout 100% Coverage. Literally a roll of graph paper with a green grid, The Scroll was created by a group of RM and JOs, graphically displaying crew, date and time, mission length, departure and landing locations and duration of crew rest. Then the standard classified message to bases were created by the RMs

and sent out. And then when all approved the whole schedule went to headquarters. Bribes, begging, snivel chits, favors, beers, seniority, etc. sometimes influenced who went where when. The Crew Wheel ensured key jobs in the squadron, DH

and assistant were 'port and starboard' in the office to keep things running. When computers came in the 80, as brand new OPS BOSS in 3, I scrolled down the print out with a ruler and discovered we had scheduled a 'BUST' or gap in coverage. I then created a cardboard template with windows cut out showing first crew's land time and next crew's takeoff so I could ensure they overlapped. My Flight Officer, LT Mark Barber had it bronzed and presented at my farewell. Ah.....those were the days!


