






Former Shadow Skipper Follows Grandfather's World War I Footsteps By Gary Foster, Captain, USN (Ret)

Former Shadow Skipper (2004-2005) Captain Gary Foster, USN (Ret) and his wife Melodie recently visited France where they visited friends that they met under some unusual circumstances. What began with a book about a La Crosse, Wisconsin, native and former Mayor of the Foster's hometown of Neillsville, Wisconsin, who served in the Army during World War I has developed into a chance friendship with two French natives and a retired US Marine Corps Sergeant Major who runs the Oise-Aisne American Cemetery in the village of Seringes-et-Nesles, located about 60 miles northeast of Paris, France. The book titled "Notes From the Trenches: A Musician's Journey Through World War I," published in December of 2017, is an account of Leo W. Foster, a bugler with Company C of the 121st Machine Gun Battalion, US Army 32nd Division. Captain Foster, the grandson of WWI veteran Leo Foster, wrote the book based on letters that Leo had written to his mother and sisters during the war.

In Château-Thierry, France, a young man named Castelyann "Yann" Moreno is a World War 1 enthusiast and historian in his own right. He collects artifacts and puts them on display to honor the sacrifice made by the Doughboys who fought over 100 years ago. In November of 2018, a friend and fellow artifact collector of his found the remains of a container in a heavily wooded area near the town of Le Charmel, France. What was once housed in the container, most likely a wooden box, had rotted away and left a stash of old metal dog tags from soldiers who were assigned to Company C of the 121st Machine Gun Battalion. The tags were found by a metal

detector in the woods and buried approximately two feet in the area where the soldiers were staying prior to the Aisne Marne offensive that began in late July of 1918. Yann and another friend of his whose name is Mathieu "Mat" Baudoin, another World War I enthusiast and historian, began an exhaustive search to identify the dog tags and find out where each of the soldiers had come from to see if they could put together a story of the soldiers' war experience. Both Yann and Mat are war soldier reenactors who don French and American Doughboy uniforms for various celebrations, such as Armistice Day on November 11th each year.

Yann conducted numerous Google searches online and Mat contacted the Wisconsin Veterans Museum in Madison attempting to establish the origin of each of the soldiers. A number of the dog tags yielded La Crosse as the city of origin of soldiers who were originally serving in the Wisconsin National Guard and in the "Old Wisconsin" 3rd



regiment, and reassigned into the 32nd Division, which was created in September of 1917 in Waco, Texas. In his research, Yann came across some pictures online of bugler Leo Foster's shadowbox and saw pictures from Captain Foster's book. By chance and using Facebook, Yann then established a connection with Gary, but he does not speak fluent English. Mat works for the American Battle Monuments Commission (ABMC) Oise-Aisne Cemetery and has picked up the English language, so he contacted Gary and began a dialogue centered around the 121st MG Battalion. Mat's boss at the Cemetery is Retired US Marine Corps Sergeant Major Hubert "Bert" Caloud, who commended Mat and Yann on their extensive project.

With Yann's help, Mat built a plaque that displays all of the dog tags that were found. All of the tags have been physically altered in one way or another prior to being buried in the dirt, and this was done in 1918 before the Aisne Marne offensive began. It was most likely done as a protective measure to keep information from falling into German hands if a soldier was killed or captured. Only one of the soldiers from Co. C killed in action is buried at the Oise-Aisne American Cemetery.

In November of this year, Gary and Melodie met Bert, Mat, and Yann and their families. They toured the battlefield where Leo Foster was wounded in action on August 1st, 1918,

and declared killed in a ction by mistake. They were taken to the exact location where the dog tags were found. The wooden X marks the spot where they were located by a man named Jean-Pierre.



The following picture shows Gary and Melodie pointing north towards the battlefield just outside the town of Cierges, France. Comparing this photograph to a picture from roughly the same location back in 1918, the battlefield was an ominous open field on a 30 degree slope. The German army was solidly in command at the top of the hill. The wooded area was known as Bellevue Farm. There were numerous casualties on this date, including several men from the Neillsville, Wisconsin, area fighting for the 32nd Division.



Notice the house to the right in the above picture. The same house is still standing, as it is visible in the photograph, below, from 1918.

While visiting the Oise-Aisne American Cemetery in Seringes-et-Nesles, we paid tribute to two soldiers from the Neillsville area that died in France. Private 1st Class John Bruny died

in March of 1918, shortly after arriving in France. He was a casualty of the pandemic Spanish Flu, which killed hundreds of soldiers and millions of people world-wide from 1917-1919. *Continued on page 10*

VQ-7 CELEBRATES 20 YEARS — 11 FEBRUARY 2020

Formerly known as the Naval Training Support Unit, and established as a fleet replacement squadron seven on 11 February 2000, VQ-7 is the aircrew training command of Strategic Communications Wing 1. The goal of the VQ-7 Roughnecks provides a constant flow of highly qualified aircrew to TACAMO's operational squadrons, VQ-3 & VQ-4.

VQ-7 accepts students from initial entry, advanced training pipelines, or from other U.S. Navy fleet platforms. These students are tasked with completing four to twelve months of rigorous training, ensuring proficiency in their respective aviation specialties. Only after mastering their syllabus and passing final evaluations will they be sent to the operational squadrons to serve as aircrew on the E-6B.

To accomplish this training and provide the fleet with the best possible product, an elite handpicked corps of instructors and staff work nearly around the clock. VQ-7 uses a myriad of tools to execute aircrew training, including classrooms, laboratories, E-6B aircraft, full motion high fidelity flight simulators, weapons systems trainers, and various computer-based training aids. In addition, as the E-6B model manager, VO-7 is charged with ensuring training and operational standardization among all users of the E-6B aircraft weapons system.

The foundation of an effective force is always solid training, and training begins, and continues, with the Roughnecks of VQ-7. Adapting daily with the ever-changing threat to our nation's defenses, the professionals of VQ-7 stand ready to train the next generation of our country's servicemen and women.



Larry Traskos memories of VQ-4 49 years ago!

TACAMO was a seat of the pants operations into bases we should never have went in too!! Ballykelly, Ireland for one! No de-icing service! Big snow the night we were there. We were all on the wing with brooms, taxiing in deep snow, an experience. I was a JG and all the O's of the crew were JGs! Buying a VHF radio from the Norwegians for a bottle of scotch to fly over Ireland! Getting a hydraulic line from the engine shop at the AFB in Madrid... again a bottle of scotch for our then hydraulic reel! "Can do... crew2"! Our airplanes literally emptied Air Force C-130 parts in the Azores and Mildenhall, England!! We limped 149806 and 891 around the Atlantic, in fact 806's nick name was 80sick"! The art of ".com shaw" and "jury rig" was an art in those days!



This was developed and drawn by Don Creager. (We flew often together and rode our dirt bikes on the power line South of the main gate.) The E-4 was the autopilot we had and was what held us in a 30 degree angle of bank for hours while the Nav slept!! This resulted in our brains likewise, being in a bank, that caused such periods of foolishness!!

Private 1st Class Otto Haugen was killed in action in the Second Battle of the Marne on August 1st, 1918.

On November 11th, Armistice Day in France, where they recognize the liberation of their country, we attended a ceremony to honor the French soldiers that were killed or served during the war. The ceremony was in the city of Epernay, roughly 90 miles east of Paris. Our friend Mat was marching as a French soldier in the parade.

It was an extremely memorable trip for Captain and Mrs. Foster. "To walk in the very places that his grandfather stood over 100 years ago, and then to see the battlefield where he was wounded, was one of the most humbling moments of my life."

Why Stay at Official Reunion Hotel?

The official reunion hotel is the center of reunion activities. It provides opportunities for networking with reunion attendees and it makes it easy to return to your room. That's obvious. But there are other reasons that you need to consider before you look at another hotel. In return for the use of the hotel's meeting facilities, the reunion guarantees the hotel that that a certain percentage of attendees will stay in that hotel. The hotel generally discounts the rate for reunion attendees from their normal charges.

If the reunion attendance does not meet the contracted sleeping room commitment, the hotel gets paid anyway. **Unfilled rooms can cost TCVA thousands of dollars.** Not only do these financial penalties hurt the current year's reunion, but the next reunion cannot negotiate as beneficial a hotel contract. In both cases the registration fee is then under pressure to increase unreasonably.

What if we don't contract for sleeping rooms? Attendees will pay more to stay at the reunion hotel. The reunion will incur additional expenses for meeting room rental fees, which can be quite costly. The hotel will not hold a block of rooms for attendees, which may leave some people quite a distance from the conference venue. In short, the reunion ends up with higher expenses; many of those attending will pay a higher price for their hotel rooms, future conference registration fees will be pushed higher.
